A Gospel Driven Righteousness

1. Intro & Context

- Paul established the church in Philippi some 10 years previously
- Continued on his missionary journeys preaching about Jesus and planting churches
- He's no longer there to pastor and shepherd them
 - Now in jail for preaching about Jesus
 - Ppl from Philippi have come to visit him and bring him supplies, take care of him
 - They fill him in on what's been happening amongst the Christians in Philippi > pretty good! > their a growing healthy church
- So he's writing this letter to them encourage them to keep proclaiming good news of Jesus, standing strong in their faith and keep living lives worthy of the gospel

2. Righteousness is our greatest need

- And in these verses he wants to spell out to them what it means to have a gospel centered righteousness
 - $\circ\,\,$ Ppl think righteousness means being a good person, living a good life
 - Not what Bible says righteousness is
 - Righteousness = means having a right standing before God
 - You can stand before him and be accepted
- Paul warning the Philippians about some ppl who were going about their righteousness in the completely wrong way
- Philippians 3:2 ² Watch out for those dogs, those men who do evil, those mutilators of the flesh.
- These guys were probably Jewish Christians who were forcing Gentile (non-Jewish) Christians to be circumcised

- Known as Judaisers > trying to Judaise Christianity > blend Christianity
 with Judaism
- Go around saying
 - "You want to be a real Christian ... yeah you need to believe in Jesus ... but you also need to keep the OT Law ... and sorry to say buddy, that includes circumcision"
- Paul says ... watch out of these guys
 - They're dogs¹
 - They're doing evil²
 - They're mutilators of flesh³
- Basically these guys thought they were being more religious, more spiritual, more obedient, more worthy of God's favour
 - Ironically what they were doing was evil and made them more like unclean Gentiles
- What this highlights is the a basic need humans have amongst themselves to be righteous
 - o This is what the Judaisers are trying to do
 - o They're trying to do things that make themselves right before God
 - Yes they knew about Jesus, but for them that wasn't enough ... they needed to add to that keeping the Law and being circumcised
 - $\circ\hspace{0.4cm}$ Unless you do that ... then you're not a real Christian
- Saying

 $\circ\hspace{0.4cm}$ You need to do this to be right with God

You need to do that to be right with God

¹ not talking cute pet dogs > wild dogs > scavengers = unclean. Because they were unclean, dogs was a word used to describe Gentiles (non-Jews)

² These guys think that by keeping OT Law they're being righteous, but in actual fact what they were doing was evil

³ Same word for mutilation is used in OT (1 Kings 18:28) to describe the self mutilation of the pagan prophets of Baal. Thus circumcision which these Jewish Christians thought was a badge that made them right with God ... Paul likens to pagan mutilation

- In one sense ... they're right!
 - We do need to be right with God
 - It's just they were going the wrong way about it
 - They were putting their confidence in what Paul describes as works of the flesh ... their religious practices and rituals
- Before Paul became a Christian ... he was the same
 - v4-6 he lists out the confidence in the flesh he had from outward obedience and religious observance
- He says ...
 - "If anyone has confidence in the flesh it's me"
 - o If anyone can boast in being religious, moral and good its him
 - o "No matter how righteous you think you are Paul says I'm better" ...
- And he lays out his credentials
- Four inherited privileges
 - o ⁵ circumcised on the eighth day,
 - \circ of the people of Israel
 - o of the tribe of Benjamin
 - o a Hebrew of Hebrews
- What he's saying here is ...
 - he wasn't a Gentile converted later in life
 - o Born as a Jew, raised as Jew
 - He was as pure-blood as Jews get
 - A true-insider
- Add to his inherited privileges ... all his personal achievements
 - o in regard to the law, a Pharisee
 - as for zeal, persecuting the church;
 - $\circ\$ as for legalistic righteousness, faultless
- He was
 - o One of the most devout, law fulfilling, leaders of Judaism in his day

- He had a seriously impressive set of credentials
- From a human perspective ... if there was anyone who was going to qualify through their own works of the flesh to have confidence before God... it was him
- To these Judaizers he saying ...
 - o You think you guys are devout & religious ... you've got nothing on me
 - o Be like me boasting of my cycling prowess to Cadel Evans!

Application

- What these Jewish Christians were doing ... and what Paul did before he became a Christians ... was trying to stack up a list of credentials with God to be right with him
 - The Bible tells us we inherently know God is there and we're built to worship him
 - o Irreligious people reject God and that truth
 - But religious people recognise that God is real and we need to be right with him
 - They know righteousness before God is their greatest need ... so they try to build a big list of credentials to ensure they will be okay with him
- "Look God I
 - Go to church
 - Give money
 - Serve on the roster
 - Lead a growth group
 - Support a Compassion child
 - o I read the Bible
 - I pray
 - See God how I do all this stuff for you"
- And they put confidence in their right standing before God because of their credentials

- This is not just something the religious person does
- It's something we all do
- Many times I've asked a person
 - "if you were to die tonight and stand before God and he asked you "Why should I let you into my good and perfect heaven?" what would you say?
- Nearly everyone I have that conversation with says
- Because
 - "I'm a good person
 - "Tried to do good to people
 - "I know I'm not perfect ... but I tried to be a good husband, wife, father, mother
 - "Try to help people
- You see what the non-religious person is doing?
 - o Rather than building a list of religious credentials
 - o They build a list of **moral** credentials
 - They think they can be right with God based on their moral goodness
- So we all do it
 - Religious and irreligious alike ... by nature we try and meet our great need to be right with God by what we do

3. Righteousness is our greatest problem [SLIDE]

- Here's the problem with all of that
- Our righteousness / our right standing before God CANNOT come from building a list of credentials to present to God
- In fact ... trying to be right we God on our own terms ... only pushes us **further away** from God
- Righteousness that we think earns favour with God ends up alienating us from God and putting us in a worse position with him
- When Paul became a Christian ... this is the thing he realised

- It's not that all of a sudden he realised he was a sinner who needed to repent
- He always knew he was a sinner
- When he sinned he repented
- He realised that to be a true Christian means not only to
 - worship by the Spirit
 - o glory in Christ Jesus,
 - o But most significantly in this context ... put no confidence in the flesh
- That is
 - o Put no confidence in his own righteousness before God
 - o Not to seek to be right before God because of his ...
 - inherited privileges
 - religious observances
 - obedience to the commandments
 - anything that's outside of Christ
- He realised ... if your confidence is in Christ, it cannot be in yourself
- So we see in v7-9 Paul says
 - O T But whatever was to my profit I now consider loss for the sake of Christ. 8 What is more, I consider everything a loss compared to the surpassing greatness of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things.
- Even after he added up ALL those impressive credentials of his inherited privileges and religious observance ... he says they are **nothing** compared to knowing Jesus Christ
 - "I gave up all those things
 - o "I gave up my
 - Self-importance
 - Status
 - Friendships

- Wealth
- Position in Jewish society
- o "I willingly gave all that up for knowing Chris"
- Paul says even when you weigh up this seriously impressive stuff they
 mean nothing when it comes to knowing Christ Jesus as my Lord
- Those things are rubbish!
 - NIV tries to be too polite here
 - o Rubbish = dung / excrement!
 - All my impressive list of credentials > all my achievements > dung / crap!
- See the power of what he's saying ...
 - You know my PhD from Oxford
 - You know my 3 Olympic gold medals
 - o You know my Australian of the Year award ... all dung!
- Illustration James Packer [SLIDE]
- Like James Packer spending his whole life being groomed to take over Kerry Packer's TV & Publishing empire
 - Born in right family
 - Raised in Bellvue Hill
 - Went to Cranbook School
 - Trained up by his dad running various subsidiaries of the empire
- Then in an instant he gives all that up to run the corner shop Lakemba
 - o I consider all that I had before as dung compared to what I have now
- What would cause Paul to let go of all that
 - What would cause Paul to want to consider his vast earthly credentials and achievements as rubbish?

He realised that to seek your own righteousness and standing before
 God is ultimately a rejection of God

[SLIDE OFF]

- Most people think there are two ways to respond to God
 - o Follow him or reject him
- But there are actually two ways to reject God
 - o Can reject Jesus and live in opposition to him irreligion
 - Can reject Jesus by trying to be moral and good and follow the law religion
- Irreligion is rejecting Jesus altogether
 - "Who knows if there is a God > if the Bible's true > how can we know > so I'm going to go live my own life"
 - That's irreligion
- Religion or moralism is rejecting Jesus as Lord and Saviour by trying to develop a righteousness of your own and presenting it to God
- The religious person says
 - o "I'm going to follow the rules
 - o "I'm going to be better than other ppl
 - o "I'm going to be very religious
 - o "I'm going to go to church, give money, etc
- Then you feel good within yourself
 - Sense of self-righteousness
 - You end up thinking I've been good therefore God owes me ... why wouldn't he accept me?
- This is what Paul was trying to do as a Jewish Pharisee
 - o This is what the Judaisers were trying to do in Philippi
- The religious person treats God like the Prime Minister
 - o I pay my taxes ... you owe me

- I pay my taxes why aren't the roads in better condition, I deserve better health care
- Religious person treats God like this ... I live a good life ... there therefore he owes me
- But true Christianity is different from both irreligion and religion
- What makes a person a Christian is not that they move from being irreligious to being religious
 - o Lots of ppl think that the Christian message is
 - Stop
 - being irreligious and start coming to church
 - not praying and start praying
 - breaking the 10 commandments and start obeying the 10 commandments
 - They think that's the Christian message > get religious
- Here's the problem with trying to be religious and create a righteousness that's based on what we do
 - o It never works!
 - It never works
- Want to know why?
- Because
 - o as hard as you try
 - o as much as you give your money
 - o as much as you go to church
 - o regardless of how much or how regular you read the Bible
 - o irrespective of how morally good you are
- On your own you can never be righteous on your own
 - You will always mess up
 - At some point you will fail

- You will sin
- And the moment do you do that ... you're no longer righteous in God's sight
 - You're track record is blemished
- That's why Paul says in Romans 3:10 "no one is righteous not even one"
- You know the other reason working for our own righteousness doesn't work?
 - Because either it will lead us into pride
 - Or it will lead us into despair
- Working for your own righteousness fluctuates depending on your religious performance
 - If you're
 - Reading your Bible regularly
 - Restraining yourself from conscious sin
 - Having a good run in being at godly spouse or parent
 - You think ... I'm doing okay > I'm being a good Christian
 - It leads you into pride
 - o On the other hand ... if you're
 - Struggling with sin
 - Being a lousy parent or spouse
 - Haven't read the Bible or prayed for ages
 - You think you're a lousy Christian > you doubt your faith and you despair
- So what do you do
 - o Try harder!
 - Succeed > proud
 - o Fail > despair ... eventually you give up because it's all too hard
- You're like a rat on a wheel ... running hard, but going now where and just getting exhausted by your religious performance

- Summary
 - Righteousness is our greatest need
 - When we seek to achieve it ourselves Righteousness is our greatest problem - because it fails
- Good news of Christianity
 - o Righteousness is our greatest gift

4. Righteousness is our greatest gift [SLIDE]

- True Christianity is not about us developing a righteousness of your own and then presenting it to God and saying now you owe me
 - True Christianity is about God developing HIS OWN righteousness through Jesus Christ and then giving it to us
- Which is why Paul says this in v8
 - o Philippians 3:8-9 I consider them rubbish, that I may gain Christ ⁹ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ-- the righteousness that comes from God and is by faith.
- Paul realised that the righteousness he was seeking by trying to keep the law was useless
- But in Christ ... there's a righteousness that comes ...
 - o not through his own good doing
 - o that didn't depend on
 - how good he was or
 - religious he was
 - moral he was
 - devout he was
 - All of which was set to fail ...
- It was a righteousness that is a GIFT
 - It's given to him BY GOD

- Paul doesn't have to earn it
- He doesn't have to flog himself to try and live up to God's perfect standards
- In meeting the risen Lord Jesus and becoming a Christian ... Paul has a right standing before God that is given to him by God himself
- That's why he's happy to count all his achievements and credentials as loss
 - o That's why he says all that other stuff ... that's dung / that's rubbish
 - o I had to let go of
 - all my achievements
 - all my credentials
 - all the things that I thought gave me credibility with God
 - So that I may gain Christ and be found in him

Application

- When you become a Christian you realise the only thing that you can base your righteousness on is not
 - Your achievements
 - Your credentials
 - Your status
 - Your religiosity
 - But only what God has done for you through Jesus death on the cross
- It's a righteousness that comes from GOD ... it's a GIFT and we receive it by faith
- God owes you nothing ... but in Christ he gives you everything
- When you become a Christian it means having to abandon anything that you think earns your righteousness and you would credit to yourself ... and rely on Christ alone instead

- And when you understand that ... it transforms your Christian experience
 - Not only does it lift the burden from your heart to develop your own righteousness
 - But it transforms the motive in which you go about living the Christian life
- Here's how ...
 - The basic operating principle of religion is I obey therefore I am accepted by God
 - The basic operating principle of gospel is I am accepted by God (righteous) therefore I obey
- The religious person is seeking to obey to be accepted
 - o Problem with that is it forces you to focuses on external > not the heart
 - It's all about the outward action
- But the thing that's driving that behaviour is
 - o Fear or pride
 - Fear of getting into trouble or being punished by God
 - Pride that motivates me not be like one of liars, adulterers, racists
- While being religious / being moralistic might change your behaviour for a while ... it won't change your heart
 - Only when the heart is changed ... that true transformation can happen in a person
- The problem with moralism is that it bends a person into a different pattern
 of behaviour through fear of consequences and pride ... rather than melting
 the heart into a new shape of joy, love and gratitude
 - Try and bend a piece of metal without heat's softening effect ... the metal tends to snap back to its original position

- o This is why people who are trying to change through moralistic behaviour find themselves lapsing back into sin
- Similarly, if you put too much pressure on metal without heat's softening effect you will break it
- Many ppl after years of moralistic behaviour abandon their faith altogether – they just give up, their exhausted, they can't keep up the effort of being good and moral
- The behaviour may change for a while by putting pressure on the will, but the heart's basic desire of selfishness isn't dealt with apart from the gospel
- But when you realise you don't have to earn your right standing before God ... but its been given to you by him as a gift of grace ...
 - o it melts your heart and
 - it transforms your motivation for godly living

Example

- The Bible's solution to stinginess is not to command you to give 10% of your income > drive you to religiosity and moralism
 - It's is a reorientation to the gospel and the generosity of Christ, who became poor so that you would be spiritually rich (2 Cor 8:9)
 - Gospel reminds you don't have to worry about money, because the cross proves God's care for you and gives you security
 - You don't have to envy anyone else ... because your God given righteousness has give you a wonderful status that nothing else can provide
 - There's a heart motivation that comes from knowing God has given you the amazing gift of righteousness in Christ
- The Bible's solution to a bad marriage or porn addiction is not merely to say "You shall not commit adultery" (Ex. 20:14)

- o It points us to the radical, spouse-like love of Christ in the gospel
- Only when you know this sacrificial, love of Christ will you have real motivation against lust
- His love is totally fulfilling, so it keeps you from looking to sexual fulfilment in other places to give you what only Jesus can
- Do you see the point?
- What makes you a sexually faithful spouse or a generous person or a good parent or a good church member ... is not just doubling your effort and trying harder
- Rather, it is deepening your understanding of the righteousness of Christ that's graciously given to you by God ... and living out the changes that understanding makes in your heart

5. Conclusion

- We all have a deep need to be right with God
 - Sadly many will try and develop a righteousness before God on their own based on moralism and religiosity
 - o That type of righteousness is doomed to fail
 - It will never be able to fulfill a righteous standing before God on your own merits
 - Further it will only lead you further away from God as pushes you towards pride or despair
 - It won't actually bring any real change in behaviour or heart
- But the great news of the gospel is God has made a righteousness available to us through the cross of Christ
 - o And it's a gracious, amazing, liberating, totally undeserved gift
- As we grasp the amazing grace of God to us in Christ and the righteousness he's bestowed upon us ... it melts our hearts

- o It motivates us to live a life worthy of the gospel
 - Not because I'm trying to earn God's favour
 - Not because I'm fearful of his rejection
 - Not in order to be accepted
- o But because Christ was rejected for me
- \circ Because in Christ I know I am already accepted and righteous in his sight
- All you and I need to do is receive it by faith
